#### **CALL TO ORDER**

Chairman Thrift called the work session to order at 5:00 p.m.

#### Melburn Kelly - EMS Report

Candler County EMS Director, Mel Kelly opened his monthly report with the statistic of calls for the month of February, which included one hundred thirty-six calls, thirty-three Non-Transports, Ninety-nine Emergency Transports. Patients were transported 76% of the total calls for the month of February where 24% were non-transports. One patient was AirEvaced, zero mutual aid assisted and zero fatalities. Mr. Kelly elaborated on the destination of each transport for the month which included Candler County Hospital to have fifty-eight; Candler General in Savannah had one; East Georgia Regional Statesboro had twenty-one with nine transported from Candler County Hospital; Meadows Regional in Vidailia had two; Saint Joseph's in Savannah had two; Emanuel Medical Center in Swainsboro had one; Georgia Regents (MCG) in Augusta had two; Memorial Medical in Savannah had six; Tattnall Memorial in Reidsville had one; Joseph M. Still Burn Center of Augusta had one and the V.A. Hospital in Augusta had two. Of these transports, nine were nursing home responses and twenty-one hospital transfers.

Mr. Kelly continued his report with an update on the EMS Building upgrades. He stated the floor covering and furniture had been ordered with an expected two weeks before deliver.

Mr. Kelly briefly explained why he felt the Board should consider changing billing companies again. Mr. Kelly stated due to a significant loss of approximately been an \$8,000.00 monthly reduction, nearly \$100,000.00 per year when the Board decided to change from EMS Consultants to C&S Healthcare Billing. Mr. Kelly concluded that Mr. Eaves is to elaborate more in depth on the proposed billing company during the regular meeting.

With nothing further discussed, Mr. Kelly excused himself from the workshop.

#### Tina Crooms - Community and Schools

Tina Crooms, Director of Communities and Schools delivered the annual report. She began by thanking the Board for the continued support. She introduced the site coordinators, Paige Jones and Roberta Graham, who work closely with the student at each school. They connect mentor to mentee, currently twelve mentors are participating providing assistance to seventeen mentees. The site coordinators also monitor attendance, behavior and academics are which are tracked for all case managed students, nearly one hundred. Ms. Crooms thanked the Board once again for their support and funding, and asked they would consider them in the future.

With no further discussion, Ms. Crooms excused herself from the meeting.

#### Jerry Lanier - Roads and Bridges Department Monthly Report

Candler County Public Works Road Superintendent, Jerry Lanier approached the Board to deliver his monthly report. He began with a request from Commissioner Robinson to replace plastic culvert pipe on Coleman Road. A quote was passed out to the Board to review. Mr. Lanier reported ten more weight limit signs had been received and placed on roads including Eden Church, Stillmore, and Griffin Ferry. Vice-Chairman Jones responded he had received reports from citizens that the heavy truck traffic along the roads where signs had been placed has decreased significantly. Mr. Lanier went on to report one of his employees had resigned. Commissioner Robinsons commended Jeremy Holloway for grading the roads in District Three. Vice-Chairman Jones asked Mr. Lanier if the County maintained the City of Metter's dirt road portion of East Hiawatha Street. He continued by stating it was in need of some ditch work. Mr. Lanier replied the extent of the County maintaining East Hiawatha included only the grading of the road. The City of Metter performed the ditch work due to utility lines that may be buried in the ditched area.

#### Robert Hendrix - Solid Waste/Landfill Report

Candler County Landfill Director, Robert Hendrix approached the Board to deliver his monthly report. Updates Mr. Hendrix spoke of included continued work on soil erosions testing underway. He also mentioned the leadership team from the Chamber of Commerce is scheduled to visit the landfill. He delivered to Mr. Eaves, the polly-cart report he received from the Tax Assessors Office for budget purposes. Mr. Gross inquired on behalf of Sheriff Miles, if the bank they shoot into behind the gun range was part of the landfill or part of the gun range. Mr. Hendrix replied the bank is on the landfill, but he did not believe there to be trash or debris in that area. Mr. Gross then asked if the bank could be dug out and squared without any violations of landfill rules. Mr. Hendrix replied this had been done before. He then inquired of the measurements the Sheriff desired reforming. Mr. Gross stated the measurements would be approximately fifty yards. Mr. Hendrix concluded by stating there is a well in that area, and he would consult with the landfill engineer considering a modification may be needed.

#### Jason Douglas Fire Department and EMA Monthly Report

Candler County EMA Director and City of Metter Fire Chief, Jason Douglas approached the Board to deliver his monthly fire response report. The Board had no questions for Chief Douglas, and he excused himself from the meeting.

#### Allen Tyler – Coroner

Allen Tyler, Candler County Coroner was unable to attend the meeting, but he delivered a request to Mr. Gross. Mr. Gross read the request to the Board, and then submitted it to Mr. Eaves for budgeting purposes.

#### Others Wishing to Address Commissioners

Caroline Fondern approached the Board to explain the financial debt the Debt Service Fee had caused. Ms. Fondern purchased land in Candler County and lives in a house on the property. Prior to her purchase, the land was split into fifteen parcels. She requested the Board to allow her an exemption considering she had not received knowledge of the fee in time to resurvey her property. No action was taken

#### **Jenny Grimes**

Candler County Clerk of Court, Jenny Grimes approached the Board with a requested she asked Vice-Chairman Jones to explain. He reported the door to the vault had been found. He went on to say the Clerk of Courts office is in need of fire proof file cabinets and a safe. Mr. Gross stated there was \$66,000.00 of SPLOST funds remaining to renovate the court house. The safes and file cabinets could be purchased with those funds.

Mr. Gross and Mrs. Grimes explain a \$1,300.00 discrepancy was found during the transition of accounts. Mrs. Grimes explained the process of closing accounts held by the previous clerk and opening new accounts that have her as the signature. Mr. Gross and Mrs. Grimes explained this appeared to be unclaimed funds and had been carried for more than five years. Mr. Gross advised the Board a financial audit would not be financially feasible. The Board chose not to take action to perform a financial audit, and to replace the funds in the account should the claimant arrive in the future.

#### **Adjourn**

The Board adjourned the work session at 6:08 p.m.
